This plan has been written in accordance with the Equality Act 2010.

Introduction

Since September 2002, the Disability Discrimination Act 1995 has been extended (by the Special Educational Needs and Disability Act 2001) to cover discrimination faced by disabled students in schools and colleges. The Governing Body has since had three key duties towards disabled pupils, under part 4 of the DDA:

- Not to treat disabled pupils less favourably for a reason related to their disability.
- To make reasonable adjustments for disabled pupils, so that they are not at a substantial disadvantage.
- To plan to increase access to education for disabled pupils.

Defining Disability

The definition of disability in the DDA is not the same as the definition for special educational needs. In particular, the DDA covers only those who have 'a physical or mental impairment which has a substantial and long-term adverse effect on their ability to carry out normal day to day activities'. This definition is considered in detail in guidance produced by the Disability Rights Commission. The DDA also covers those with:

- · Severe disfigurements.
- Impairments which are controlled or corrected by the use of medication, prostheses, and aid or otherwise.
- · Progressive symptomatic conditions.
- · A history of impairment.
- Cancer, HIV or multiple sclerosis at the point of diagnosis.

However, the DDA does not cover addiction to or dependence on nicotine, tobacco or other non-prescribed drugs or substances; hay fever; or certain mental illnesses which have anti-social consequences. Accordingly, it might be possible for a student to have special educational needs, but not be disabled for the purposes of the DDA, and vice versa.

Purpose of the Accessibility Plan

The purpose of the plan is to outline how St. Patrick's School will strive to improve and maintain access to the following areas:

- To ensure that all pupils are fully involved in school life by identifying barriers to participation and in finding practical solutions.
- To increase the confidence and expertise of staff and support staff when teaching or aiding pupils with a wide range of disabilities.
- To develop strong collaborative relationships with pupils and parents and increase satisfaction in the provision made by the school.
- To promote equality of opportunity and promote positive attitudes towards children, young people and adults who are disabled.
- To ensure that pupils with additional needs have access to high quality teaching and resources which are stimulating and appropriate.
- To ensure that information is made more accessible for pupils, parents and visitors.
- To improve the physical environment of the school to increase safe access for pupils, staff, parents, community users and visitors.

Overall Aim

St. Patrick's school aims to treat all stakeholders, including pupils, prospective pupils, staff, and governors, fairly and equally and, wherever possible, takes reasonable steps to ensure that no individual is placed at a disadvantage. Our aim is to work closely with those pupils who may need additional support, their families and any relevant outside agencies in order to help them access the curriculum and to participate in school life as fully as possible.

School Context

St. Patrick's is a Roman Catholic Voluntary Aided School that offers a primary education to children aged 5 - 11 years. In practice this means that the Archdiocese provides 15% of certain repair and building costs, the remainder being funded by central government via Sefton Local Authority. The Archdiocese raises this money by a school levy.

The school was opened in 1968 and is situated in an attractive suburb of Southport, by the sea. It caters primarily for Catholic children living in the parishes of St. Patrick's and also, St. Marie's.

The school mission statement underpins all aspects of school life at St. Patrick's and the school environment is calm and nurturing with a strong ethos of mutual respect. Staff are hard-working and committed and they are strongly supported by a highly skilled and dedicated management team. The children are hardworking, responsive and well-behaved and the parents are hugely supportive of all aspects of school life. We have a strong team of teaching assistants who possess many valuable skills which are utilised throughout the whole school.

The standard number for admission is 50; there are currently 343 on roll and the school is two form entry, 12.5% of our children receive F.S.M. and 7% of the pupils are on the SEND Register. The school has 17 teachers, including the Headteacher, 17 teaching assistants, 2 office administrators and a caretaker (February 2023).

School site

All our classrooms are on a single site and the school has benefited from considerable building extension work in recent years. The school comprises of twelve permanent classrooms in the main building and two outside classrooms. There is also a library, a computer suite and a large multi-purpose hall. Outside there is a purpose-built outdoor play area for Foundation Stage which incorporates an enclosed safe access to the Reception classrooms. There are separate infant and junior playgrounds and a school field to the rear of the building. Each of the play areas are equipped with climbing and play apparatus.

Current accessibility:

- The school has ramp access available at points around the building.
- There is a disabled toilet with changing facilities at the front of the building.
- Inhalers for those children with asthma are kept in classrooms and are readily accessible. A record of use is noted.
- EpiPens are kept in the child's class and are readily accessible.
- A copy of all medical information is kept in the class file and a master copy record is held in the school office.
- Children with food allergies/intolerances/cultural choices are catered for through discussion with the on-site kitchen manager, parents/carers, class teacher and lunchtime co-ordinator. Individual Health Care Plans are devised by the SENCo, with the parents, for those children with complex allergies.
- Administration of medicine consent forms are completed by parents/carers outlining the illness and amount and time of medication administered.
- There are 4 designated First Aiders (including two Lunchtime Supervisors) currently holding First Aid certificates.
- A range of resources are available in school to aid learning e.g. writing slopes, pencil grips and sensory resources (inc. purpose built sensory room).
- A Defibrillator is available on site and is kept at the front of the school building. Some staff members have been trained in the use of this equipment and are aware of its location.
- All classrooms have direct access to outside area.
